Ray was a most knowledgeable Geography teacher with one of his students achieving a gold medal for coming 1st in Ireland in Leaving Cert. Geography.

He was also gifted in the field of sport. In his own student days in St. Jarlath's College Team, he was on the Senior football team for three years in the 60's, winning an All Ireland medal in 1964. He was an exceptional athlete with many Connaught titles to his name.

His excellence and achievements on the field of sport were acknowledged when he was presented with the accolade of "Best All Round Athlete" and received a gold watch – the most prestigious of awards.

Ray brought sporting talents to the Community School where he coached many basketball teams, reaching and winning All Ireland finals in the 80's.

Saying 'Goodbye' to Christy Ruane



Finally we would like to wish all the students the very best in their upcoming exams.
















Post Leaving Certificate Courses

Ballyhaunis Community School has been involved in the provision of quality Adult Education since its foundation 30 years ago. Hundreds of students have gone through the training offered and have been successful in their chosen careers. Some used the opportunity to repeat a Leaving Certificate subject while gaining lifelong skills.
