

Mary was an excellent teacher, much admired and praised by all her students, who would like to take the opportunity to thank her most sincerely for all her time and dedication during her teaching career.





B.C.S. 30 Year Anniversary



30 Years of Ballyhaunis Community School

My thoughts on 30 years of Ballyhaunis Community School would fill a book. It could be a brilliant idea for a bestseller! From my own point of view the 30 years went all too quickly and were a happy and enjoyable experience for me. The setting-up of the Community School 30 years ago was a new experience for the West of Ireland with only about a half dozen community schools in the country altogether. Our school was quick into its stride under the stewardship of Eddie Thornton and a dedicated team of teachers prepared to make things work! That dedication did not finish in the classroom. With the large staff and a wide variety of interests, it was only a matter of time before the demand for extra-curricular activities would take up the time of our willing staff members. Sport was my main excuse for escaping from class an odd time. Involvement in the school musical was another. Active involvement in our teachers union, playing inter-schools teachers basketball, sports day in the school, debating competitions, talent competitions and bun sales were all designed to occupy the minds and spare time of both teachers and students. The important thing was that there was something for everyone. Gaelic sport was my number one and I am certain sure that all the participants gained valuable experience in taking part. I have met many past pupils over the years and all would agree that sport provided an outlet for them. It made what otherwise might be a difficult school life more tolerable. It's a pity the Department of Education doesn't recognise

the value of sporting activities and provide them on timetabled basis. This would take the pressure off management, staff and students. The value of taking an active part in sport would then be more meaningful. Our successes on the field of play over the years would compare favourably with most schools of our size. Senior 'B' Connacht wins in 1980, '93 and '02 bring back happy memories with a whole host of other wins at various other levels over the years. Of course there were disappointments, but when it is the taking part that matters everything is positive. The musicals gave an opportunity for the stage-minded to perform before an audience and I can recall many top class professional performances by our students who were guided by dedicated and enthusiastic teachers.

It is always a pleasure for me to meet with and have a chat with past pupils of Ballyhaunis Community School, all living successful lives in whatever they choose to do. Remember, past pupils are now parents and teachers. There were sad times too with the passing of students and teachers. May their souls rest in peace. Nowadays some of us retired folks meet and recall how things were, how things are and wonder. I tell them school is about today preparing for tomorrow, making use of yesterday in the process. School days are the best days of our lives, our parents used to say. Thankfully some of us had a good upbringing.

Vision by Christy Ruane

On a small table in the centre of the room stood three lighted candles. On a separate table stood one large candle. The spacious staff room had a scent of fresh paint and the spotless carpet matched the brown leather covered padded seats which were arranged in an elliptical formation around the room. The teachers from the three former schools, in anticipation, drifted in ones and twos towards the staff room, some making a conscience effort to sit beside a former colleague from a different school-goodwill was the new axil grease needed to propel us on a smooth journey ahead. This was September 1977, and it was the momentous occasion of the first staff meeting of the new Community School in Ballyhaunis.

The meeting commenced by Fr. Des Walsh reading a special prayer invoking the help of the Holy Spirit for the success of the school. Then the three former principals, Sr. Joan Fahy, Fr. MacMyler and Mr. Eddie Thornton from the Convent of Mercy, Patrick's College and the Vocational School respectively, took a rush each and lit it from one of the lighted candles. In turn they extinguished the candles and together they lit the large candle. There was an atmosphere of palpable silence, indeed there was a sense of emotion-the three old schools had just passed onto history. There were a few glazed eyes, especially among the older staff members. A wag sitting beside me leaned over and whispered, "Look a rogue's gallery!"

We were now on virgin ground. The Community School was a new concept in education and unique to the West of Ireland. There were less than a dozen in the whole country at the time. The merging of three separate schools, each with its own ethos and identity would barely be contemplated in most towns. It took vision, foresight and courage to embrace this innovation. We had now "put the hands to the plough" and there was no looking back. Personal interests and comfort zones were set aside in the interest of the common good.

There was a steely vision for a bright new future for secondary education in Ballyhaunis. The little ceremony was a powerful symbol of unity and harmony-something that has endured in the school to this day. We were embarking not only on a new educational journey, but what seemed like a spiritual mission.

The staff of nearly forty, which included four nuns and three priests and of which almost two thirds were male and with the exception of six or seven were all in their twenties and thirties including the Principal, Eddie Thornton. We had a singular intent on making Ballyhaunis a centre of educational excellence. "Young men see visions, old men dream dreams"

There was great confidence going forward. We knew that we had the professionals, the expertise and the reservoir of knowledge to complete with the best and now with everything under the one roof and with the most up-to-date facilities and equipment, it was a matter of implementing the curriculum.

Students were no longer labelled honours or pass. They could now enjoy a system of time-tabling and "settling". This system allowed students to slot into classes in individual subjects appropriate to their abilities and they could select subjects from which they had aptitude. Apart from the usual subjects, sport, recreation and culture were central to the educational philosophy of the school. Teachers brought all kinds of ideas on extra curricular activities to staff meeting. Anything worthwhile was implemented and this was possible because virtually every teacher got involved in some sort of leisure outside of class. The production of the bi-annual musical was another cultural highlight of the school. The co-operation of teachers was almost unreal. Large numbers of teachers traveled around the country supporting teams that reached All-Ireland semi-finals and finals in a variety of sports.

While extra-curricular activities were a central part of school policy, however, academic excellence had to take priority. All parents want their children to do well in their exams. It can be very satisfying and rewarding to see a pupil who on enrolling needs special education and then after five years, leaving the school as a happy and well rounded young adult with a successful leaving cert. There were many proud moments in the school when students took first place in Ireland in a range of subjects across the curriculum. There were several winners of the 1916 commemorative scholarships. There are seven of these awarded annually based on the results of different groupings of subjects in the Leaving Cert. When the school took two out of seven in the same year, it prompted an educational correspondent for The Irish Times (the late Christina Murphy) to visit the school and write a major feature article on how a community school in a town in the West of Ireland could win two out of the seven scholarships, considering that 60,000 students sat the Leaving Cert. One of the best achievements I experienced was a class result. This happened to my Leaving Cert maths class of 1994. Twenty-five A's were recorded and seventeen of these were A1's.

Overall, Ballyhaunis Community School has been a very positive and happy place in which to work. We had the sad experience of losing two wonderful colleagues, in their prime, Michael Glynn, a brilliant mathematician, and, Anton O' Malley, a tree of knowledge in English literature. Only four of the original staff remain after thirty years but the replacement crop of young vibrant, dedicated professionals are eager and willing to keep up the great tradition of the school. Although the gender is now reversed the application is even better and the staff room is much easier on the eye! It's heartening to see so many past students coming back to help on course.

Having retired over a year ago and looking back over the last thirty years and taking nostalgia into account, Ballyhaunis Community School, since its foundation has been a place of generous spirit, a place of small problems and large hearts. I think the mark of a good school can be judged on how the staff treats each other and the way the school takes care of the weakest and the most vulnerable. The school comes out with top marks. Under the steady eye of the present captain, Pat Mc Hugh everything augers well. The special education department in the school is second to none and the convivial atmosphere in the staff room has been marked upon even by Department Inspectors. When all is stripped bare my abiding happy memories are of the breaks and fun moments relaxing in the staff room having a chat with a friendly colleague.

These four thoughts are in retrospect to an invitation from the editor to write something for the yearbook. They are simply random musings about the school from a somewhat different perspective.

I had always believed that the school was a vibrant community that had earned itself a high reputation. I was somewhat apprehensive on one of my first visits back to the school to see the school musical. Was I to be disillusioned in that my positive view was a myth, seen through rose tinted spectacles? I was most reassured and I have had the same positive experience every time since, most recent being the launch of the CD to commemorate 30 years. I am proud to have been part of that experience.



I estimate that more than 4000 students have passed through in the 30 years. The class photographs on the wall are a most valuable record. Past students continue to make their mark, at home and abroad, even in the most distant parts of the earth. The myriad of talents and skills they have developed in every spear of life is remarkable. They should be proud of their achievements. It is not for me to evaluate or judge the contribution the school has made. Ultimately, each person has had to take the responsibility for their own lives and plough their own furrow. As teachers, we were part of that journey during a very formative period of their lives. We rejoice in their success and are also proud of their achievements, let them be big or small.

Finally, I like to thank all the staff for their continued invitation to school functions and social gatherings. Though gone, we feel part of the school and hopefully that link of past and present will continue for the future. There was always a great spirit of unity and co-operation of which I have great memories and that is alive and well.


Ms Finn and the class of 1B also contributed to the St. Vincent De Paul appeal by compiling a Christmas box for less fortunate children.

"A Case of Identity"

FORENSIC SCIENCE DAY

On Tuesday, January 22nd 2007, senior Biology students and Transition Year students were Forensic scientists for the day, with a murder to solve!

The day involved an interactive presentation "A Case of Identity" by a Forensic Scientist from Australia. Students were presented with a crime scene where they were required to examine the evidence in order to solve the murder.

The presentation incorporated exhibits and displays so that students could see and understand the techniques used by Forensic Scientists to solve crimes. These included:

Processing the Crime- students learnt how to search the crime scene and use search patterns to process the scene in three dimensions.

Physical Fit & Refractive index - using these techniques students were able to identify the murder weapon.


Fingerprinting - by locating & matching fingerprints found at the crime scene students linked the victim with the murder weapon and pieced together events leading up to the crime.

DNA Profiling - students assessed the results of this highly sensitive technique to eliminate innocent suspects and to identify the guilty party through the blood and saliva evidence left behind at the crime scene.

Drink Spiking - information on drink spiking was presented, along with simple-to-use tests that can identify a potentially spiked drink.

Microscopy - students examined the fibres found on the victim and used these to help eliminate potential suspects.

It was a very enjoyable experience for all students while also being of great benefit to the senior biology classes.



Post Leaving Certificate Courses

Ballyhaunis Community School has been involved in the provision of **quality Adult Education** since its foundation 30 years ago. Hundreds of students have gone through the training offered and have been successful in their chosen careers. Some used the opportunity to repeat a Leaving Certificate subject while gaining lifelong skills. Others saw the value in learning skills that would be beneficial any where in the world and at any time in life. Many more use the opportunity of second chance education to resource and up skill themselves in this technologically oriented world. Many learners complete Post Leaving Certificate or Further Education and Training courses leading to FETAC awards with the specific intention of using their award to progress to 3rd level through a system known as the Higher Education Links Scheme. This scheme has been in existence for almost a decade and this year twenty-nine higher education institutions including universities, institutes of technology and private colleges, are offering places on a variety of courses to candidates who have successfully completed awards.



Students educated through our further education sector received qualifications from the RSA Examinations Board, The Euro Institute Office Technology, The National Council for Vocational Awards (NCVA), City and Guilds and now **FETAC** – The Further Education Training Awards Council. 




Senior Hurling
