Transplant Joy

As many of you are aware Ms. Bernie Osgood, a member of the teaching staff in our school donated a kidney to her 7 year old daughter Rebecca in July 2010. Little Rebecca suffered kidney failure at the age of two as a result of ecoli poisoning and up until her transplant had been receiving 10-hour nightly dialysis treatment.

Initially when Bernie asked to be considered as a potential living donor, she was not allowed as she had recently given birth to her son Conor and needed time to recover. In the meantime Rebecca's father, lain, was screened for liver donation but was not a compatible donor. Undeterred, Bernie persisted and eventually was allowed to go through the screening process which took 6 months. The outcome was a successful liver donation transplant from mother to child which took place at Beaumont hospital last July. Rebecca was well enough to return home just two weeks later on the day of her seventh birthday. Rebecca is now a happy, healthy little girl and has returned to school.

There are currently over 650 people in Ireland awaiting life saving organ transplants including heart, lung, liver, kidney and pancreas. Almost 2,600 people in Ireland are enjoying extended life as a result of receiving organ transplants.

Bernie and her family extend the invitation to each of us to consider becoming a donor in the event of our untimely death and to discuss this decision with loved ones. Organ Donor Cards can also be obtained by phoning the Irish Kidney Association

It will now be possible to store a donor card, the 'ecard' on Smart mobile phones. The new free 'E-card' offers an alternative to the traditional donor card and the public can now keep their completed organ donor e-card on their smart phone, rather than traditionally in their wallet. The E-card app is available by searching for and downloading 'ecard' from the App store.

life Saving Organ Donation

The Junior and Leaving Cert Biology courses are an excellent introduction to the living world. The Leaving Cert programme in particular includes a section on human anatomy and physiology. We study how all systems like respiration, digestion etc. function in coordination.

Excretion is one of the functions in the human body and is carried out by the skin, the lungs, and the kidneys. Every minute approx. one litre of blood passes through the kidneys and in the process gets ride of toxic molecules. The kidneys also maintain fluid balance in both volume and composition and play an important role in regulation of blood pressure (BP). For different reasons the kidneys can fail to function properly and at a certain stage medical intervention is necessary. This can be done in essentially two ways; dialysis or transplant. In relation to transplantation a kidney can be from a living or deceased donor. The first living kidney donor

operation was carried out in Boston in 1954. In Ireland the first operation of this kind was carried out by the late Dr. Peter McClean in 1974.

The number of living donor/recipient transplants has increased over the years, for example there were 18 operations in 2009 and 23 in 2010. I am one of the eighteen living donors, I donated a kidney to my wife, Geraldine, in 2009 and this resulted in a dramatic improvement in her wellbeing.

All great medical advancements have been possible due to study, research and work of many dedicated people. For our Leaving Cert students subjects like Biology and Chemistry may be a stepping stone to a career in the exciting world of medical science.

When I arrived here in Ballyhaunis Vocational School in 1973 Haulie was a young red haired whiz kid having started work in the Vocational School some six months earlier. (The hair hasn't changed)

My first introduction to Ballyhaunis GAA was through Haulie and in the early days in Ballyhaunis Vocational School we had many trips to various parts of the county for matches. I had the pleasure of getting a guided tour of beautiful Mayo. Our teams were not always the best footballers but they were very willing and enjoyed a few hours away from the hum drum of school life. One trip I can well remember was to the official opening of a new pitch in Swinford vocational School. We had a great game of football and were well treated afterwards.

Haulie's service to the life of Ballyhaunis Community School was second to none. He was the first there each morning, willing to keep a watchful eye over exuberant students. Whenever a helping hand was needed to get students over the line, Haulie could be depended upon to give a little extra. His loyalty to the school and various managements were greatly appreciated and valued. You were a trusted and loyal colleague of all the staff.

Gaelic games were an important part of the life for Haulie and throughout his career he gave his free time to provide students with the opportunity to play. He got great joy from seeing his teams perform. The winning part was secondary, but important. I can recall one story attributed to him, on arriving home from a match, he was asked how they got on and what the score was? His reply waswe won 5-17 to 1-8. Who played well was the next question? Haulie replied 'nobody'.

The clock calls time on all of us Haulie- you can rest easy, be satisfied with a job well done. You have played well. Good luck and best wishes and may you have many years of happy retirement


1st Year Creative Writing



ONE DAY IN THE LIFE OF AN LCA HC&T STUDENT!

For Our Hotel Catering and Tourism Task the teacher said we could make a product like Jam or Chutney or we could stage An Event and do a three-course lunch for at least ten people. Even though there was a lot more work for a three-course lunch, we still wanted to do it. We looked at photos of the lunches other LCA HC&T students had done over the last few years. Some of our friends also said, that it was one of the biggest highlights for them, when they did the lunch for the teachers.

We had completed Module One and some of Module Two of our HC&T Course. We had also done plenty of cooking since last September. In October 2010, we organised a Hospice Coffee Morning for a Key Assignment. We made



Chocolate Chip Muffins, Mixed Berry Muffins, freshly ground coffee in Cafétiere pots and a few pots of tea for 50 teachers. We delivered everything to the Staffroom in time for the 11 O' Clock break and collected €257 for Hospice that morning. Doing a Three-course Lunch for ten teachers however was a much bigger task.

With the decision finally made we started with a brain-storming session for ideas on what we could serve for a three-course lunch. We broke up into smaller groups, one group researched Starters, another Main Courses and the Third group checked out some Desserts. Each group had to come up with at least 5 ideas. We looked for ideas in Cookery Books, Food Magazines and The Internet. When each group had come up with 5 ideas, we decided we could carry out a **survey** of the teachers to see what would be the most popular choices. We designed a survey with the information from each group. We printed 50 copies of it and delivered them to the staffroom. When we got the surveys back, we counted up the numbers for each option. With the help of our IT teacher-Mrs Loftus we used Microsoft Excel to show the results. The preferred starter was Melon Fan with Raspberry Coulis, for the Main Course-Chicken Maryland, with Chunky Homemade Potato Chips & Tossed Salad followed by Rich Chocolate Gateau, served with Chocolate Ganache Sauce & Ice cream.

Conor Fitzgerald designed a Menu Card, he printed off 14 copies so that he could give one to each teacher on the day of the lunch. Ms. Flynn asked the Vice Principal-Ms. Moran about a date for doing our task and also if she could get 10 teachers to come to the event. Each of us designed an Invitation and gave it to a teacher from the list given to us by Ms Moran. The teachers were delighted with the invitation and Mr. McHugh, our Principal sent a letter, officially accepting our invitation.

We worked in groups to compile a shopping list for the event and to work out all the jobs that would have to be done. We researched some other areas to help us with Our Task e.g. Cooking Methods we would be using...Deep Fat Frying, Baking, Roasting; Jobs in the Food & Hospitality Industry e.g. Chef, Waiter/Waitress, Barman; Safety & First Aid in the Kitchen, Garnishing & Decorating Dishes; Preparing a Venue for a 3 course Lunch, Table Setting & Napkin Folding, Food Safety & Hygiene in the Kitchen & during Service

Good communications and teamwork were essential to Our Task. We met regularly as a class to make sure everyone was getting on all right and to come up with solutions to any problems we were meeting with. We would let the teacher know what jobs we had completed and what jobs we intended doing next.

Most of us helped to set up D2 the day before the event. This was the venue where we would be serving the three-course lunch to the teachers. We tidied and cleaned the room and removed the extra furniture. We covered tables in white banqueting roll and then put some tablecloths and place mats on the tables to make it look nicer. We set the tables with the cutlery, crockery and glassware we had washed, dried and polished that morning. Two of the lads went off and picked daffodils to decorate the tables. We set up a separate table for the cups, saucers and sugar bowls.

We learned how to do table service and each of us took turns practicing this skill.

The day before the event we were mostly involved in preparing the food for the lunch. We made the cakes for the dessert. We made breadcrumbs, egg wash, seasoned some flour, "butterflied" the chicken breasts and coated the chicken and pineapple rings in breadcrumbs before refrigerating them. We prepared the salad ingredients, made coleslaw & the garnishes, as well as the French Salad Dressing and the Raspberry Coulis. We had to work quickly so that each food would not be too long in the "Danger Zone" i.e. room temperature-as this could lead to food poisoning.

The morning of the event we finished decorating the cakes each decorated with a 'Strawberry in a Tuxedo'. All that remained for us to do with them was put a scoop of ice cream on each plate just before serving. The Melons were prepared and nicely presented with Raspberry Coulis and some blueberries for decoration. We prepared the Chunky Homemade Potato Chips. Finally the Banana Fritters had to be coated in breadcrumbs.

At 12.00pm we started cooking the food. By 12.45 the teachers arrived. They were welcomed and shown to their seats. Four of us kept things going in D2 while the main courses were being put on plates and garnished in the kitchen. We served the starter and when the teachers were finished we cleared the plates away and then served the Main Course. Now we understood the pressure Ms. Flynn had told us we would be under when it came to service. You have to be quick, accurate and very careful not to injure/burn yourself or anyone else when the pressure is on!

As a surprise, we had prepared some extra food for the rest of the teachers in the staffroom. This was delivered at 1.10 pm along with chocolate cake. While the teachers were eating the main course in D2, we made the tea and coffee. We put the cups & saucers, milk and sugar on the table and then served the tea & coffee. All of a sudden... the mad rush was over...we realised for the first time in two days the pressure was over, everything had gone according to plan. Its hard to describe the feeling...we were exhausted but on a high.

The teachers asked us to come into D2 for photographs etc. They each spoke about the lovely meal and the very good table service they had received. When the teachers left at 1.40pm, the panic was back on as we had to get D2 cleared and set up for class at 2.10pm. We took a quick lunch break after that and came back to the kitchen at 2.45 for the big clean up. We got finished and everything put away before 3.30pm. We had a well-earned cup of tea and for the few minutes before the bell went we sat down, relax and talked about the day. We were very tired but really proud of what we had achieved.

Ballyhaunis ABC (Aid for Belarusian Children) Chernobly Project

The Chernobyl disaster was a nuclear accident that occurred 25 years ago at the Chernobyl Nuclear Power Plant in Ukraine. The disaster began during a systems test on 26 April 1986 at reactor number four of the Chernobyl plant, which is near the town of Pripyat. Large areas in Ukraine, Belarus, and Russia were evacuated, and over 336,000 people were resettled.

The Chernobyl disaster triggered the release of substantial amounts of radiation into the atmosphere in the form of both particle and gaseous radioisotopes, and is the most significant unintentional release of radiation into the environment to date. It has been suggested that the Chernobyl disaster released as much as 400 times the radioactive contamination of the Atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

Some children in the contaminated areas were exposed to high radiation doses because of an intake of radioactive iodine-131 from contaminated milk produced locally. These children suffer from life long health problems that are attributable not only to the Chernobyl accident, but also to the poor state of post-Soviet health systems.

Twenty five years after the catastrophe, restriction orders remain in place in the production, transportation and consumption of food contaminated by Chernobyl fallout.

Ballyhaunis ABC (Aid for Belarusian Children)organizes various fundraising activities during the year to bring children from Belarus to Ireland. Twelve children arrive every summer for a months rest and recuperation. They are hosted by families in Ballyhaunis and the surrounding areas.

During the month of May a lorry travelled to Belarus to bring much needed supplies to various orphanages there. The 4A class with Mrs. S. Mulroy and Mrs O. Lyons organized a collection of items to be sent to a teenage orphanage in Belarus. Many thanks to the students and staff who were so generous in donating unwanted items to these very deserving young people.

4th Year Girls fitness Classes

Mayo sports partnership has introdued a new grant scheme for schools to get girls active in sport. The partnership provides schools with a grant of €600 to bring instructors of all disiplinces into the school for one hour per week. This new initative has been offered to 4th year girls and they will enjoy the following fitness classes, zumba, aerobics, boxercise, dance and pilates. This scheme emphasises the importance of fitness amoung girls in a fun and safe environment. It has been a great succes here in school with over 30 girls participating.



Laughter filled the room as he talked about the 'green people mover', Max's (his teddy bear) eyes full of sand, 'you like that huh?' and his days on the football pitch getting smashed by a guy called 'Adversity' until he got the guts to stand up to him, 'bring it on!'. Jason even joked about his weight, 'I breathe in the natural air and grow another butt!' The way he portrayed his 'ADwanna ride bikes? Right now I'm serious', was genius and so was the rest of Jason's enthusiastic and energetic speech.

When the motivational speaker announced he will 'take off his mask' no one expected what happened next. Jason spoke with tears in his eyes of his difficult childhood. 'I grew up in a house where my father was abusive, everyday he would make me feel like I was worth nothing'. By the time he was nine he was suicidal, he would spend hours in his mother's room holding a revolver to his head... His older brother who was also abused became an alcoholic at the age of seventeen. The dead silence in the room made me realise that everyone was just as shocked at this as I was. Jason's happy, positive exterior would have never hinted at his tormenting past.

So what was the point of all that? To make each and everyone of us see that everybody has hurt, but it does not mean that your past has to shape your future. No matter what you are going through there is always someone there to talk to, you just have to be brave enough to take your mask off. For nine years Jason Maupin has been showing people all over the world there is a lifeline, you don't have to drown in your despair. He was truly inspirational, uplifting and unforgettable; everyone left the talk with a different perspective and a smile on their face. So remember, you are never alone, 'someone loves you, someone cares about you, today it's me. I love you'.

forenzic Science Day

On 2nd February 2011 senior Biology students were nonjury forensic scientists for the day as we solved the murder of an Australian schoolgirl, Sally.

The day involved an interactive presentation by James, a good humoured Australian forensic scientist. Students were presented with a crime scene where they were required to examine the evidence to solve the murder.

The presentation incorporated exhibits and displays enabling the students to understand the techniques used by forensic scientists to solve crimes. These included Processing the crime: students learned how to go about examining a crime scene using search patterns to process the scene in three dimensions

Physical fit and refractive index: students used their knowledge of physics to identify the murder weapon. DNA profiling: students assessed the results of this forensic technique to both eliminate suspects and identify the guilty party through blood and saliva evidence.

Drink spiking: students were taught how to test drinks for the presence of illegal substances.

Microscopy: students used this advanced forensic technique to examine clothing fibres found on the victim linking suspects to the scene of the crime The day proved to be an enjoyable experience for all and of invaluable benefit

to our study of Biology. On behalf of all the students we would like to thank Mrs. Keane, Ms. Murtagh, and Mr. Muarry for kindly organising this worthwhile event.
