NOVEMBER WE REMEMBER





A TRIBUTE TO FR. JOE COONEY

In writing this tribute I'll avoid using Fr. Joe's official title as he didn't like the title Canon, he used to joke "Once you become a Canon you cease to be a person as people start referring to you as "The Canon"! Fr. Joe Cooney was not only parish priest of Ballyhaunis he was also very much part of the fabric of our school community as he served as sacramental chaplain from 2003 until his retirement in 2011. He also served on the Board of Management for many years where he took his responsibilities seriously and could be relied upon to offer advice that was always sound and sensible. Fr. Joe was first and foremost a deeply religious man who had a marvellous capacity with words. His homily at the annual Graduation Mass was always powerfully expressed with a firm conviction of the importance of faith especially for our young people. He captured the essence of the moment and his advice to the leaving certs who were about to move on into the wider world was always sincere and from the heart.



"If you stand for nothing you fall for everything". These words expressed how he truly believed how important it was for young people to have a faith and to be true to it, to rely on it and most importantly to be proud of it. He delivered these

words with the perfect mixture of humour and seriousness and when he spoke he commanded the attention of everyone in the room. You knew that Fr Joe cared and that he meant every word that he said. He willingly attended for confessions in the school at both Christmas and Easter, and long after he had retired, he sat for several hours because he knew that it was important to remain in touch with young people and encourage them to practice their faith for as long as possible. Fr. Joe had the ability to appreciate the events that were important to young people in a way that people many years younger did not. Fr. Joe passed away from this life on March 20th just at the beginning of the restrictions introduced in response to the COVID-19 pandemic and unfortunately there wasn't an opportunity to pay tribute and honour him the way he truly deserved. Fr. Joe's passing is a happy release for him, but it is tinged with sadness for those of us who knew and loved him as we recognise that we have lost a genuinely good person and a friend. Fr. Joe has earned his heavenly place with God, our prayer is that he continues to be a beacon of light and hope for us from his new eternal home.



Talk of the virus was already running through BCS but after we found out the school would close, it was all anyone could talk about. Everyone was wondering if a lockdown would be called, or if we would really be back to school by the end of the month. It was a really nerve-wracking time for most of us, especially people who had family, friends or neighbours who would be at risk.

At the end of that day, we were all leaving school with as many books as we could carry. Some teachers had already assigned some work to start with, others said they would be keeping in touch via Microsoft Teams. Everyone has had to make sacrifices for the sake of our safety. But the real heroes of this crisis are the people working in shops like Supervalu, Tesco, Lidl and Aldi, who have been keeping the shelves stocked. The heroes are the doctors and nurses who risk their health and safety to treat people, now more than ever. The heroes are the pharmacists who are selling the medicines that people need to survive, the people who are volunteering at the testing centers, the people who are trying to develop a vaccine. We can all do our parts to help them by self-isolating, washing our hands and only making the trips that are necessary for us. By doing all of these we are reducing the chances of spreading the virus to others.

This crisis will only end if we all stay at home and stay safe and if we do, we will rise above the virus and return to how life was before Thursday, March 12th.

3RD YEAR VISIT TO THE FRANCISCAN FRIARY IN GALWAY

On Monday, the 10th February the 3A, 3C and 3E Classes visited the Franciscans in Galway, accompanied by their teachers Ms. Burns, Ms. Fallon and Ms. Phillips. Our aim was to interview the Franciscans for our Religion Journal. When we arrived at the Franciscan Church, we met with Fr. David, who is in charge of the Franciscan community in Galway. He wore a long dark robe with crocs. He told us about their founder St. Francis of Assisi whom Pope Francis is called after. He also told us why



Assisi whom Pope Francis is called after. He also told us why he became a Franciscan; he had reached a stage in his life where he felt there was something missing. He told us that he wasn't looking for a wife or a significant other, but felt a vocation from God to work for the Franciscans. He explained that he had to make a lot of sacrifices to become a Franciscan, for example, he had to sell some of his most valuable belongings such as his house and car. The whole process of becoming a Franciscan takes a total of eight to nine years. The Franciscans take vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. They are not permitted to marry as they are metaphorically married to religion. One surprising thing we learnt was how much the Franciscans do to serve people in need. They run a drug rehabilitation centre and a homeless

They have also set up a Housing Charity called Respond which provides housing for people around the country. After interviewing Fr. David, we got some free time to have something to eat and to look at the various shops. As interesting as chatting to Fr. David was, this was the highlight of the trip for a lot of us.

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3RD YEAR TRIP TO THE POOR CLARES

On a bright and sunny morning in February 2020, 3rd year students set out on a trip to Galway. Classes 3B and 3D accompanied by their teacher Ms. Mulroy visited the Poor Clare's community on Nun's Island Galway city. This religious order consists of a small group of nuns. They are an enclosed order who dedicate their daily lives to prayer. Third years were fascinated to see first-hand how meaningful and fulfilling their lives are. Sr. Colette spoke with a happy smile outlining a typical day in their lives. Their day starts and finishes with prayer, punctuated with work in the kitchen and garden. One of the most surprising things we learned is that people call regularly in person to the sisters where they ask for prayers regarding a specific concern or trouble they have. We also learned how the people of Galway really value having the nuns in their community. Every morning, mass is celebrated in the church that is attached to the convent and many people from the city of Galway join the sisters. Everyone really enjoyed the day and were delighted to know more about people who dedicate their lives to God through joining a religious community. It helped to enlighten us and broaden our minds about faith and the different ways people choose to live their lives.

'share our similarities and celebrate our differences'.



Transition Year was an enriching experience, full of great craic, rewarding challenges, and lasting memories. This year, the TY students took part in an array of activities, went on several school trips, and gained experience in a working environment.

In October, the TY students headed to Killary Adventure Centre for a 3-day trip. Located on the coast of Connemara in Galway, they were surrounded by the beautiful scenery of the ocean and mountains. During the day, they participated in several outdoor activities such as kayaking, cliff jumping, wall climbing, and archery. During the evenings, students took part in group challenges and games. This trip was one of the highlights of the year

Community Care was one of the most rewarding aspects of transition year. The TY students got the opportunity to volunteer at different places in the local area. Some of these facilities include Western Care, MSPCA, Scoil losa and Meals on Wheels. By helping out in the local community, students learned more about the valuable services that are provided in the Ballyhaunis area.

This year the TY students took part in a variety of unique workshops on film making, radio presenting, and forensic science.

In November, the students participated in radio transmission workshop, where they made an advertisement suitable for radio. First, they had to write a script, and then record their piece in a radio van.

In December, the students took part in a movie production workshop, where they learned how to make short films. Some students made comedy skits and used special effects, while others made a news report about an issue in the school.

In February, students participated in a CSI Workshop. They learned about the role of a forensic scientist and how forensic science is used to solve crimes. In the study hall, the students investigated a mock crime scene. They wore full bodysuits and gloves, and were assigned different jobs as part of the investigation.

This year three teams took part in the Junk Kouture competition. This competition sees teams from different schools throughout the country design dresses using recycled materials to express their creativity and imaginations. With the assistance of Ms Lennon, each team made very interesting and extravagant dresses, using a range of recycled materials.

Designed by Maeve Donnellan, Louise Cox, and Orlaith Coffey, the "Colourtrending" dress was made using recycled paint cards and old paintbrushes for the headpiece. Lana Biesty, Beth Lloyd and Jessica Henry made a dress called "Queen of Hearts", by using old playing cards as the dress and casino chips as a waist piece. The final dress, named "Denim Warrior" was designed by Niamh Duffy, Deirbhile Boland and Roisin Denning using recycled denim for the dress and top, and recycled wood for the sword, shield, and headpiece. Maeve, Jessica and Deirbhile were the models for their dresses.

The "Denim Warrior" dress modeled by Deirbhile, made it to the western regional finals in the TF in Castlebar, but unfortunately, they did not qualify for the finals in Dublin.

This year, eight TY students accompanied by Mr McGarry and Ms Hargaden-Whyte took part in the Erasmus student exchange program in collaboration with other schools from Reunion Island, Spain, Italy and France. DEBATE IN DUBLIN CASTLE

On Thursday the 27th of March, the council of European Union Debate took place in Dublin Castle. The Council of European Union Debate is an event in which many schools across the country are all assigned a Country in the European Union to represent. The topic of the Debate this year was the European Green Deal, specifically reducing greenhouse gas emissions. The debate is based on how the actual European Union would discuss new motions to bring or not bring into law. This usually involves opening speeches from each country, followed by an open floor debate and voting on the topics brought up in the debate. This was the first year our school took part and our school was given Austria to represent at the debate. To get on the team we had to make a speech about climate change in Austria. I made the team with Elizabeth Lloyd and Ciara Hosty. Ciara and I were the main speakers and Elizabeth was the note taker. We had to do a lot of research and prepare an opening speech before the day of the debate. On the day of the debate we got the train to Dublin from Ballyhaunis at 6am. We got to Dublin Castle at 11 to sign in. We received badges with our country and school name on it, and flags from our country. We then got our picture taken and met the Austrian deputy ambassador, and she gave us badges and Austrian chocolate. When the debate started for the first round every team made an opening speech, Ciara made our opening speech. For the second and third rounds it was an open floor debate, in round two each country made a speech to further their points in round one, and in round three each team made a speech to address what other countries had commented on in round one and two. There were many topics debated on the day of the debate, such as how each country in the European Union uses renewable energy, and whether or not Nuclear energy is a suitable replacement for fossil fuels was the main subject of debate in the third round. Another topic of debate was whether there should be a punishment fine on countries that don't meet the goal of 40% carbon emissions reduction, this was frequently discussed in the second and third rounds. Both of these topics were opposed by a general majority vote. The runner up team was Slovenia and everyone on the team won an ipad each, and the winning team was Germany, their prize was a trip to debate internationally in Brussels and an ipad for every member of the team. 












TY MUSICAL
