What does a Garda do?

 Maintains law and order as a member of the Garda Síochána in the Republic of Ireland.

Pay & Salary - Garda

Salary Range €36k - €59k

Garda Trainees receive an allowance of €305 per week for the 33 weeks leading to attestation.

Annual Salary may be modified by a variety of allowances and grades.

Working Life

The primary responsibilities of An Garda Síochána include, but are not limited to the following functions:

Ensuring our nation's security;

The prevention and detection of crime;

Enhancing community safety;

Reducing the incidence of fatal and serious injuries on our roads and improving road safety;

Working with communities to prevent anti-social behaviour;

Promoting an inter-agency approach to problem solving and improving the overall quality of life.



Educational Requirements

(A) Have obtained an Irish Leaving
 Certificate with a grade D3 minimum
 in five subjects at ordinary level*,

or

(B) have a Level 5 Certificate (Major award) on the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ),

- Applicants must be proficient in either or both of the following:
 - i) the Irish language
 - ii) the English language



Physical requirements: Pre-entry test



Applicants will need to complete;

(1) Fitness Test



(2) Physical Competence Test
