

Eadaoin Flynn Retirement



Event Management:

The Future Leaders classes run this blitz and take part by being referees, linesmen/women, umpires and coaches. Sports Journalism:

In this module, we study legendary GAA commentators and commentate over their favorite three minute clip from an iconic match. Then, we got the opportunity to interview past and present GAA legends in the interview task. This year, students interviewed many inter-county and local club GAA stars on the topic 'what the GAA means to you'.

Performance Analysis:

This was a really interesting module as we got to look into the details that you wouldn't notice while watching a game. We looked at the statistics of a match, for example, kickouts, turnovers, possession and more. This gave us an insight of what the management of teams have to look at after every game.




