The town of Ballyhaunis has long been recognised as an example of inclusion and integration. This is also true for the Community School. We are very conscious that we are a melting pot of many cultures and traditions. Our ambition is to ensure everyone feels welcome here and feels a sense of belonging. Some years ago we revised the School Motto to "Unity in Diversity" to reflect our commitment to ensuring all students feel comfortable here irrespective of their background.

To underline this commitment this year we applied to be recognised as a "School of Sanctuary". "School of Sanctuary" is a concept which through a framework called Learn/Action/Share, schools work to strengthen their identity as a place of welcome and inclusion in their community, becoming a beacon of sanctuary for those who are vulnerable to marginalisation or isolation. Early in March members of the "School of Sanctuary" committee visited BCS to assess the school's approach to inclusion. I am delighted to report that the committee gave us a glowing review and were more than happy to bestow the title "Champion School of Sanctuary" on BCS. We are now just one of a handful of schools across the country with such an accolade and we are very proud of the achievement. A huge thanks to Mrs. Murphy and her committee for leading the charge on this wonderful initiative.

The last year has seen record numbers attend our school. 751 students were enrolled in September 2024 which is the highest number since the school's foundation. This is a wonderful vote of confidence in the school by the locality and it is something we greatly appreciate and do not take for granted. We are constantly looking to improve so that we continue to serve the local community to the best of our ability. To that end, we introduced two new subjects at Leaving Certificate level last September. Physical Education and Computer Science are now on the curriculum and these were very well subscribed. It is important that the School remains agile and ready to evolve to ensure our students graduate with the skills necessary to contribute to modern society.

Although teaching and learning are the most important functions within the school, BCS would be a much poorer place were it not for the range of extra and co-curricular activities on our offer to our students. Many of these activities hone skills and characteristics that may not be cultivated through merely academic pursuits. The promotion of these activities is an affirmation of our Mission Statement which commits us to the holistic development of all our students. On my own behalf and on behalf of the Board of Management of the school I wish to thank all teachers and the increasing number of local volunteers who assist us in fulfilling this commitment.

A very real example of this is the School Tour which took place over the Easter Break. Fifty 5th Year students packed their bags and headed for the beautiful city of Barcelona. This was a wonderful opportunity for these students to go abroad with their friends and get a flavour of the culture and traditions of another European country. The tour took in some elements of history, architecture and science alongside a considerable amount of fun. I want to thank Mrs. Henry, the tour co-ordinator and her colleagues Mr. Noone, Mr. Murray and Mrs. Keane for facilitating this wonderful endeavour. I want to pay tribute to Mr. Ginty and Mr. Gormally for their hard work in compiling this excellent publication. This is no easy task but, as always, they rose to the challenge and I wish to commend them for their efforts this year. They were ably assisted by a terrific team of students who can also take great pride from being involved in such a wonderful project. Also, a special thanks to Fr. Farragher who is responsible for most, if not all, of the pictures in the magazine.

Finally, I would like to extend my best wishes to our Leaving Certificate students who will be starting their own life journeys next year. We wish them health and happiness in whatever path they ultimately find themselves on. I sincerely hope the values and wisdom they have acquired here will sustain them in whatever challenges they may face in the years ahead.

There were many gruelling winter training sessions in less than ideal weather conditions (many thanks to Ballyhaunis GAA Club, The Centre Of Excellence and Ballyhaunis Rubgy Club for letting us use their facilities for our out of school training sessions) before our next game against St Nathy's Ballaghaderreen on the 21st of January. We can only commend the girls commitment and dedication to the team to train even during their school holidays and throughout their mock exams. But the extra sessions paid off in the end. St Nathy's put up a fierce battle in bitterly cold conditions in The Centre of Excellence with the game going to extra time, but the girls emerged victorious winning by a goal and a point to continue their march to the Connacht final.

The sun shone brightly on what turned out to be a perfect Connacht Final day. It looked like it was about to be another easy win for the girls with Ballyhaunis scoring three goals early in the first half, but Glenamaddy weren't going to let the trophy go that easily. They equalised the game with ten minutes to go. But out of sheer determination the girls managed to score a late goal with minutes remaining on the clock to secure a historic win for Ballyhaunis Community School. Wild celebrations ensued but the girls weren't finished yet as they now progressed to the All-Ireland semi-final in early March.

The match was set for the 7th of March 2025 versus Scoil Mhuire Agus Íde from Limerick. The girls took a long winding journey to St Rynagh's GAA Club in Offaly. Both teams started slow, and they went in level at half-time. Despite the girls putting in a valiant effort in the second half, a few near misses and injuries meant the girls were narrowly beaten by a strong Scoil Mhuire outfit.









